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Communication Tips for ENFPs:

- You tend to be outgoing, personable, optimistic, energetic, and enjoy collaborating and encouraging others.
 - → TIP: Some people distrust highly energetic and enthusiastic persuasion. Be willing to tone down the pace and energy level when presenting information and ideas to people who are more reserved, quiet or skeptical.
- Remember that others will need to see the logic and details behind your novel ideas.
 - → TIP: Be practical and logical as well as personal and inspired. Make sure your ideas are grounded and realistic.
- th may be easy for you to change course and leave projects undone. This can annoy those who are tasked and detailed oriented.
 - → TIP: In addition to conceptualizing and realizing ideas, be sure to follow through on initial assignments before moving on or provide updates when things change.
- Since harmony and collaboration are important to you, you may find it uncomfortable to deal with interpersonal issues and conflict.
 - → TIP: Be open to giving and receiving constructive feedback and see this as an opportunity for group. Be careful not to take feedback personally.
- Since you value and encourage variety, you may easily be distracted.
 - → TIP: To ensure you don't lose sight of the task at hand, set boundaries to make sure you're not sidetracked by people's stories and needs.
